A. BACKGROUND

CRS Farmer-to-Farmer (F2F) Program is a USAID funded 5-year program (July 2018 – June 2023) that will provide technical assistance from United States (U.S) volunteers to farmers, farmer groups (cooperatives and associations), agribusinesses and other agriculture sector institutions. The program objectives are to facilitate economic growth within targeted agriculture sub-sectors, enhance sub-sector inclusiveness to expand participation to a broader range of individuals and communities and to increase the American public’s understanding of international development issues and US international development programs. Volunteers, recruited from all States and the District of Columbia, are individuals who have domestic careers, farms and agribusinesses, or are retirees who want to participate in development efforts.

F2F program will assist in agriculture development, commodity value chain competitiveness and firm upgrading by providing technical assistance to introduce new technologies, innovations and development of local capacity for more productive, profitable, sustainable and equitable agriculture systems.

The Timor-Leste Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries Strategic Plan¹ recognizes the fundamental importance of agriculture to Timor-Leste's economy and the impact of agriculture on poverty reduction, food and nutrition security, economic growth, and income and employment generation through its linkages to other sectors of the economy. The agriculture sector in Timor-Leste accounted for 19% of Gross Domestic Product (GDP), or over \$253 million in 2013. However, there is a considerable net deficit in agricultural trade as imports in 2014 were valued at approximately \$60 million. Major imports include rice, sugar, meat (chicken, beef, pork), vegetable oil, fish, milk, and vegetables (potato, onion)². In rural communities 57% of women and 60% of men are actively involved in agriculture³. Agriculture consists primarily of subsistence farming with limited access to inputs, technical knowledge, and market linkages. There is a heavy reliance on traditional agricultural practices such as slash-and-burn cultivation. Most smallholdings are mixed rainfed farms growing maize, cassava, red kidney beans, sweet potato, rice, groundnut, and vegetables. Coffee, coconut and candlenut are the most common tree crops. Livestock, such as poultry, pigs, cattle, buffalo, goats and sheep are raised on a small-scale and extensive

Dom Bosco Foiluro - the largest agricultural compound in the EAO region that is located within 145 hectares of agricultural land in the Far East of Timor-Leste as the first Salesian Boarding school after the second missionary expedition landed in 1946. Due to the bad road situation, it takes not less than 6-7 hours from the capital Dili to reach this remotest presence in Timor-Leste.

Now is 71 years of history, thousands of former boarding students, this Dom Bosco ETA (Escuela Agricola Tecnica) school was going through many challenges, discontinued twice: first due to the turbulent social and political situation (1975-1988) and then recently (2015-2017) due to many external reasons. Dom Bosco Foiluro Alumni can be found in any part of Timor, serving their country in many important roles.

Six SDB strong community (Rector Fr. Transfiguracão Antonio Pinto) with 3 priests, one Salesian Brother and two practical trainees is the core animating nucleus of the large EPC looking for the Agricultural School (200+ students, boys and girls), High school (1000+ students), services to the Salesian Family (Foiluro FMA community is 1 km distance, Dom Bosco Alumni and ADMA), involved in pastoral ministry to many chapels of the nearby Los Palos (SDB) parish.

The large agricultural compound serves partly as the training ground for the ETA students and for subsistence agriculture. There is also a huge challenge of sustainability of our mission in Foiluro. At present time there is large scale poultry farm and small Horticulture, pigs, cow & buffalos farm. They want to improve the quantity and quality of farm, but it is lack of knowledge for increase the production, and budget for renovate the facilities, so the community is praying for any possible help from oversea agencies.

B. ISSUE DESCRIPTION

Dom Bosco endowed with agricultural potential given its favorable soil, water, and climatic conditions. It is estimated that 100 percent of total land area is suitable for producing a wide range of; annual and sessional crops such as grains, vegetables, tree crops and various forest products. Despite this great potential, only a small portion of this land has been converted to crop land for vegetables production. Effort Dom Bosco is to maximize the utilization of land through increasing the knowledge on technical side for Teacher student and workers.

Dom Bosco Agriculture Collage is receiving around 75 new students every year. Around 200 students stay in dormitory if they are still studying in the Dom Bosco Fuluro. Like most agricultural technical education schools, students in the morning are learn the theory in classroom and in the afternoon is time for practicing. The purpose of this practicing is in addition to implementing the theory was learned as well as to get additional revenue to meet the operational needs of Dom Bosco itself. One of the cultivate form the labor and the students during practice section is vegetables production to fulfill needs in dormitory and the rest is sold to buy other needs.

The obstacles facing by Dom Bosco was the low production of vegetables due to the lack of knowledge in the agronomy side from the Teachers, students and workers regarding to the Agronomy side like how to prepare the soil, seedling, planting and maintenance plants. At a certain season they must buy from outside around 40% to meet consumption need in the dormitory. Especially during the rainy season which is from December to July each year.

C. OBJECTIVES OF THE ASSIGNMENT

The main objective of this volunteer assignment is to train and/or technically assist the targeted teachers' students and workers on improved vegetable production. Train and advice on minimal use of off-farm inputs and on management practices that restore, maintain and enhance ecological harmony. This assistance is expected to contribute to improve agronomic practices which will also directly contribute to better quality of produce and increase productivity per unit area of land. By applying this training and recommended practices, Dom Bosco will sustainably produce vegetable for feed the students in dormitory and increases income generated from the sale of the product.

The volunteer expert will spend significant time with the Dom Bosco, directly assist and train them with skills on the following;

1. Share the science and skill of modern vegetable production systems
2. Train worker and student on: land preparation, seedling, planting, irrigation, crop rotation, use of green manures and compost, mulching, crop diversity, integrated pest management, and weed management.
3. Advise on organic soil fertility management
4. Advise on feasible techniques of pest and disease control
5. Need assessment for the livestock for write the Scope of Work (SOW)

The beneficiaries of this assignment will be 260 (60 employees and 200 students). The host will be selected training the participants during the assignment period.

D. HOST CONTRIBUTION

Dom Bosco will select, determine and mobilize the attendance for the training participants. Dom Bosco will also ensure that the necessary class rooms and local training aids and other teaching materials are

in place. The host will also provide the volunteer with and facilitate meal services for the volunteer on training days. Dom Bosco will also assign a focal person who can guide and facilitate the volunteer specialist during the assignment period. The host will also provide office space and office furniture. Sometimes Dom Bosco will provide a vehicle if any vehicle is available now when it is needed

ANTICIPATED RESULTS FROM THE ASSIGNMENT

This assignment volunteer will contribute to the following:

1. Improved vegetable production system
2. Increased productivity per unit area of land
3. Student and worker aware of the importance of growing vegetable
4. Increased in vegetable production to meet dormitory need and additional income
