1.2.1 Objective 1 in your SOW

To support the archdiocese develop land use planning for the Canaan farm in order to properly utilize the 128 acres land resources to ensure higher productivity that also takes care of the environment

a) Progress with the objective

A plan was developed in consultation with key staff within the Archdiocese that addressed myriad of conservation, sustainable agriculture, and other environmental services consistent with present and anticipated future land uses.

Expected impacts/results

Reduce the costs of protecting key infrastructure from severe gully erosion. Increase the economic productivity, utility, and aesthetic beauty of the site. Beneficiaries include the orphanage, People living or owning property downstream, people living within the view shed, visitors interested in learning about sustainable agriculture and conservation practices, pilgrims and others using the site for spiritual uplift and contemplation.

Two additional farms, Monduli Juu and Karangai, were visited and recommendations were produced.

Southern Illinois Volunteer Travels to Tanzania to Share Skills with Local Farmers

Farmer to Farmer program promotes economic growth and Agricultural development in East Africa

John Groninger, a Forestry professor at SIU travelled **to Tanzania** for two weeks to share his technical skills and expertise with local farmers. John's assignment is part of Catholic Relief Services' Farmer-to-Farmer (FTF) program that promotes economic growth, food security, and agricultural development in East Africa.

The focus of my project was natural resources conservation as farmers are dealing with degraded soils and the challenges of farming on hilly land. It was amazing how well our experiences in southern Illinois translated to the situation in Tanzania. My hosts were very good farmers but they seemed to benefit from a fresh point of view, especially when it came to dealing with erosion problems. I'm looking forward to sharing this experience with my students at SIU.

Funded by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), the five-year program matches the technical assistance of U.S. farmers, agribusinesses, cooperatives, and universities to help farmers in developing countries improve agricultural productivity, access new markets, and increase their incomes.

In Tanzania, John worked with the Catholic Archdiocese of Arusha in conservation agriculture training and giving technical assistance to farm managers to enable them to effectively and efficiently utilize the land resource for agricultural production in order to finance the Archdiocese development and evangelical work. Those directly impacted by this work included an orphanage and people living in the surrounding city and villages.

John's volunteer assignment is one of nearly 500 assignments that focus on agriculture, food security and nutrition in Ethiopia, Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda. This is the first time CRS has been involved in the 28-year-old Farmer-to-Farmer Program funded by the U.S. government.

CRS is partnering with five U.S. institutions to tap into the rich diversity of the U.S. agriculture community: the National Catholic Rural Life Conference, Foods Resource Bank, National Association of Agricultural Educators, American Agri-Women, and the University of Illinois' College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences.







The U.S. volunteers will travel to East Africa for anywhere from one to six weeks, their expenses covered by USAID.

"One thing we are certain of is that this program will be beneficial not just to the farmers in East Africa, but also to the volunteers from America," said Bruce White, CRS' director for the program. "It's going to make the world a little bit smaller for everyone involved."
