 - Generally the communities I visited have patriarchal tendencies. However the SHG groups are run by women and their meetings represent an exclusively women centered space. The groups have greatly enhanced the social capital and economic independence of women in the community. Many women have taken leadership role in their communities since joining the groups and have positively influenced opinions in their communities in regards to women's issues, including FGM and opportunities for schooling after child birth.

I was not able to identify gender dynamics affecting my assignment. The groups were very forward in sharing information.

- b) How might CRS or the host organization improve opportunities for the women in this host or host community?
 - Evidence collected during the assignment shows that the existing program design effectively empowers women and improves opportunities to claim social, political and economic rights. Because this project is focused on creating opportunities for poor women, additional funding for expansion into other sub-locations would yield positive results. There are over 2,000 project participants and 10,000 children in participant households. The reach of the program model is very large and likely a good investment for improving opportunities for women.
