1.5 Gender

a) What gender roles did you recognize in your host community? Did these roles play a part in your assignment? How?

Loro-Oyam SACCO is housed in an owner occupied building. The owner and his immediate and extended family reside in a courtyard setting enclosed behind the SACCO. Volunteer noted when a male visitor was being served tea the daughter (assumed) of the owner presented the tea after she dropped to both knees. When finished serving she then backed away on her knees while facing the guest. A similar incident occurred by wait staff at the Margarita Hotel wherein a female served bent to her knees for a female guest. The male wait staff did not perform in a similar fashion.

The host environment is easily defined as male dominated as most of the professionals are male. The SACCO accountant, who also doubles as a teller, is a well-educated and informed female who is an outstanding role model for the females in the area.

Three of the SACCO Board of Directors are female out of a total of nine.

[City] Area Volunteer Travels to Uganda to Share Skills with Local Farmers

Farmer to Farmer program promotes economic growth and Agricultural development in East Africa

Michael Mayott, a **volunteer** from **Billings**, **MT** travelled **to Uganda** for **2** weeks to share his technical skills and expertise with local farmers. Mike's assignment is part of Catholic Relief Services' Farmer-to-Farmer (FTF) program that promotes economic growth, food security, and agricultural development in East Africa.

"I am grateful and humbled that I am able to offer the people of Uganda assistance in economic development of their country" said Mike.







Funded by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), the five-year program matches the technical assistance of U.S. farmers, agribusinesses, cooperatives, and universities to help farmers in developing countries improve agricultural productivity, access new markets, and increase their incomes.

In Uganda, Mike worked with Loro-Oyam Savings and Credit Cooperative in computer application training and giving technical assistance to their staff and Board of Directors to enable them to automate their client records. Up to 850 beneficiaries were reached

Mike's volunteer assignment is one of nearly 500 assignments that focus on agriculture, food security and nutrition in Ethiopia, Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda. This is the first time CRS has been involved in the 28-year-old Farmer-to-Farmer Program funded by the U.S. government.

CRS is partnering with five U.S. institutions to tap into the rich diversity of the U.S. agriculture community: the National Catholic Rural Life Conference, Foods Resource Bank, National Association of Agricultural Educators, American Agri-Women, and the University of Illinois' College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences.

The U.S. volunteers will travel to East Africa for anywhere from one to six weeks, their expenses covered by USAID.

"One thing we are certain of is that this program will be beneficial not just to the farmers in East Africa, but also to the volunteers from America," said Bruce White, CRS' director for the program. "It's going to make the world a little bit smaller for everyone involved."
