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# Marshfield, WI Area Volunteer Travels to Kenya to Share Skills with Local Farmers

Farmer to Farmer program promotes economic growth and Agricultural development in East Africa

**Gary Ruegsegger**, a **semi-retired dairy farmer** from **Marshfield**, **WI** travelled **to Kenya** for **2.5** weeks to share his technical skills and expertise with local farmers. Gary's assignment is part of Catholic Relief Services' Farmer-to-Farmer (FTF) program that promotes economic growth, food security, and agricultural development in East Africa.

"The experience allowed me share my many years of dairy cattle farming with the Little Sisters of St. Therese of the baby Jesus, and to see all the wonderful missionary work they do. They currently care for 39 children up to age of 3 or 4 years old, and less fortunate elderly in the surrounding community of Machacha. The Kenyans are very inviting, warm and generous with what little they may have. I would strongly encourage anyone to







volunteer in east Africa who enjoys giving of oneself to others, travelling and in addition to helping to make the world a better place.," said Gary.

Funded by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), the five-year program matches the technical assistance of U.S. farmers, agribusinesses, cooperatives, and universities to help farmers in developing countries improve agricultural productivity, access new markets, and increase their incomes.

In **Kenya**, **Gary** worked with **Little Sisters of ST. Therese of the baby Jesus** and local dairy farmers in **dairy cattle management** training and giving technical assistance to improve to enable them to **increase dairy milk production and profitability**. Up to 40 beneficiaries were reached.

Gary's volunteer assignment is one of nearly 500 assignments that focus on agriculture, food security and nutrition in Ethiopia, Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda. This is the first time CRS has been involved in the 28-year-old Farmer-to-Farmer Program funded by the U.S. government.

CRS is partnering with five U.S. institutions to tap into the rich diversity of the U.S. agriculture community: the National Catholic Rural Life Conference, Foods Resource Bank, National Association of Agricultural Educators, American Agri-Women, and the University of Illinois' College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences.

The U.S. volunteers will travel to East Africa for anywhere from one to six weeks, their expenses covered by USAID.

"One thing we are certain of is that this program will be beneficial not just to the farmers in East Africa, but also to the volunteers from America," said Bruce White, CRS' director for the program. "It's going to make the world a little bit smaller for everyone involved."
