# Rockland, Maine Volunteer Travels to Nairobi, Kenya to Share Skills with Local Farmers

### Farmer to Farmer program promotes economic growth and Agricultural development in East Africa

**Scott C Tilton,** an artist from **Rockland, Maine** travelled **to Kenya** for **3** weeks to share histechnical skills and expertise with local farmers. [Name]'s assignment is part of Catholic Relief Services' Farmer-to-Farmer (FTF) program that promotes economic growth, food security, and agricultural development in East Africa.

This was an outstanding opportunity for me to share my knowledge of Food Safety with a local producer in Kenya." said Tilton. "I have always wanted to explore Kenya; learn about its culture and interact with some of its people. This program provided me with the means to do that, all while making a positive and practical difference. I am very grateful for the ministry of Catholic Relief Services for making this wonderful experience possible".

Funded by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), the five-year program matches the technical assistance of U.S. farmers, agribusinesses, cooperatives, and universities to help farmers in developing countries improve agricultural productivity, access new markets, and increase their incomes.

In **Nairobi, Tilton** worked with **Stawi Foods and Fruits** in hygeinic food production training and giving technical assistance to **the Stawi employees** to enable them to eventually achieve HACCP Certification and expand to overseas markets. Five employees were trained in HACCP principles over an eight days preiod.

Tilton's volunteer assignment is one of nearly 500 assignments that focus on agriculture, food security and nutrition in Ethiopia, Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda. This is the first time CRS has been involved in the 28-year-old Farmer-to-Farmer Program funded by the U.S. government.

CRS is partnering with five U.S. institutions to tap into the rich diversity of the U.S. agriculture community: the National Catholic Rural Life Conference, Foods Resource Bank, National Association of Agricultural Educators, American Agri-Women, and the University of Illinois' College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences.

The U.S. volunteers will travel to East Africa for anywhere from one to six weeks, their expenses covered by USAID.







"One thing we are certain of is that this program will be beneficial not just to the farmers in East Africa, but also to the volunteers from America," said Bruce White, CRS' director for the program. "It's going to make the world a little bit smaller for everyone involved."
