International Agriculture Education Fellowship Program (IAEFP)

PROJECT OVERVIEW

International Agriculture Education Fellowship Program (IAEFP) is a USDA funded program that provides opportunities for eligible U.S. citizens to assist developing countries in establishing schoolbased agricultural education and youth extension programs. Participating schools in the host countries receive classroom instruction, field demonstrations, entrepreneurship projects, and leadership development expertise provided by fellows.

Improve host countries 'ability to meet the food and fiber needs of the domestic population.



Strengthen and enhance trade linkages between host countries and the United States agricultural industry.



Develop globally minded United States agriculturalists with experience living abroad.

PROJECT STRATEGY

- CRS will recruit a cohort of nine fellows to serve in secondary schools for the 2021 – 2022 school calendar year for 10 months with the purpose of scaling up innovative agricultural education approaches aligned with Government of Uganda's (GoU) newly revised Lower Secondary Curriculum.
- 2. Fellows will accomplish key activities aligned with the new active, learnercentered, and competence-based curriculum. Activities will include; helping school administrators and teachers to understand the new agriculture curriculum, introduce and adapt innovative U.S.-based instructional materials, support use of materials through classroom instruction, design & facilitate practical field-based demonstrations, entrepreneurial skills development through promoting smallindividualized or group projects, community engagement while promoting youth extension programs. Other key fellows' activities will include: Fellows-Teachers' experience sharing on lessons from the US learner-based approach to agriculture education, leadership, public speaking, and career development in agriculture.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- IAEFP fellows will strengthen school-based agriculture education reforms through introduction of innovative methodologies/approaches in classroom instruction, practical field-based activities, youth extension, leadership and entrepreneurship skills development.
- Ugandan teachers working with fellows will improve knowledge and skills in experiential learning, problem solving, and implementation of a learner-centered approach aligned with the new curriculum.
- Students will be able to learn and earn through established group or individualized entrepreneurial projects and appreciation of the full agriculture value chain.
- IAEFP fellows will contribute to strengthening trade linkages between Uganda and U.S. agricultural industry through interactions with the American Chamber of Commerce Uganda and agricultural industries with ties in the US.

 Fellows, teachers, and learners increase their appreciation of the value of international relations and the intersection between food security, economic development, and trade.
